

Items Banned from Disposal in North Carolina Landfills

No person shall knowingly dispose of the following solid wastes in landfills:

1. Used oil.
2. Yard trash, except in landfills approved for the disposal of yard trash under rules adopted by the Commission. Yard trash that is source separated from solid waste may be accepted at a solid waste disposal area where the area provides and maintains separate yard trash composting facilities.
3. White goods.
4. Antifreeze (ethylene glycol).
5. Aluminum cans.
6. Whole scrap tires, as provided in G.S. 130A-309.58(b). The prohibition against landfilling whole tires applies to all whole pneumatic rubber coverings, but does not apply to whole solid rubber coverings.
7. Lead-acid batteries, as provided in G.S. 130A-309.70.
8. Effective January 1, 2008 - Beverage containers that are required to be recycled under G.S. 18B-1006.1. (This statute applies to commercial establishments selling beverages on-premises.)
9. Effective October 1, 2009 - Motor vehicle oil filters.
10. Effective October 1, 2009 - Recyclable rigid plastic containers that are required to be labeled as provided BELOW, that have a neck smaller than the body of the container, and that accept a screw top, snap cap, or other closure. The prohibition on disposal of recyclable rigid plastic containers in landfills does not apply to rigid plastic containers that are intended for use in the sale or distribution of motor oil.
 - a. For polyethylene terephthalate, the letters "PETE" and the number 1.
 - b. For high density polyethylene, the letters "HDPE" and the number 2.
 - c. For vinyl, the letter "V" and the number 3.
 - d. For low density polyethylene, the letters "LDPE" and the number 4.
 - e. For polypropylene, the letters "PP" and the number 5.
 - f. For polystyrene, the letters "PS" and the number 6.
 - g. For any other, the letters "OTHER" and the number 7.
11. Effective October 1, 2009 - Wooden pallets, except that wooden pallets may be disposed of in a landfill that is permitted to only accept construction and demolition debris.
12. Oyster shells.
13. Effective April 1, 2011 - Discarded computer equipment.
14. Effective July 1, 2011 - North Carolina has banned the disposal of computer equipment and televisions.
